DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Towards World Understanding

We all belong to different cultures, and whether we think about it in microcosm in our countries, or macrocosm around the world, each culture has a different value system that leads to uniqueness in the definitions of right and wrong, moral and immoral, acceptable and unacceptable. These differences, if not understood, combined with differences in language and its use, lead to suspicion, resentment, mistrust and hatred, and often escalate into conflict.

How often do we sub-consciously, and indeed consciously ascribe certain characters and motives (very often negative) to people we have never even spoken to, based purely on tribe, race, nationality or religion? When you look at the world through red glasses, everything looks red.

And yet, when properly examined, all the people of the world have got a commonality in the basic elements of their value systems that can be a strong basis for establishing sameness and appreciating difference. We have the same

basic needs and wants, and, on any scale, our sameness weighs much more than our difference.

The last part of the Object of Rotary calls upon all Rotarians to advance World Peace and Understanding, and this is actualized through activities in the International Service Avenue. We carry out activities that reach across our borders, our Rotary Districts, to reach Rotarians and communities elsewhere. We send out Group Study Exchange teams and Ambassadorial Scholars. We develop and implement humanitarian grants with clubs from other parts of the world. And yes, we financially support the Rotary Foundation so that all these can be funded.

While all these activities and programmes deliver specific benefits to individuals and to communities, the high level motivation is to underscore, explore, and demonstrate sameness while at the same time appreciating and understanding differences among races, cultures, and religions so that together, we can make the world a more peaceful place.

Let us reflect on this during this month. Let us examine

ourselves as individuals so that we can start removing those personal mental biases that stop us understanding those around us:

Let us remove the colour from the glasses through which we look at other tribes, cultures, races, religions and countries. Let us then move as individuals and clubs to take more active role in the activities that promote World Understanding and by so doing, help others remove the colour from their glasses.

THE NEW CLUB LEADERSHIP PLAN (CLP) IMPLEMENTATION

Dear Club President-Elect, you must by now have realised that the Club Kit you received provided information for Club Officers based on the New CLP - under committees of Club Administration, Membership, Service projects, The Rotary Foundation and Public Relations.

The newly developed CLP is designed to allow Rotary Clubs, through long-term planning, to become successful and effective clubs. It also places new importance

and emphasis on club administration, membership and public relations in addition to our essential service projects.

Please note that our four avenues of service have stood the test of time and the new CLP does not affect these fundamentals. It emphasizes consensus for decision making, leadership continuity, project management and involvement in Service, Fellowship and Training. It provides a direct Extension of the District Leadership Plan to the Club level, provides list of steps Clubs should take to implement the plan, and fosters continuity and consensus among leaders in the Club. It is supported by the District Structure and new Recommended Rotary Club Bylaws.

As you embark on the preparation of your Club plans, you will realise that it is easier to align the plans to the new CLP, rather than the four avenues of service. It is therefore highly recommended that you review your Club Bylaws as part of your Club Team Building process to enable you implement the new CLP. Please note that the new CLP can be implemented at any time, and in my view, the time is now.

Assistant Governors, please take time with every President-Elect and their Board to lead them through the new CLP and The Planning Guide for Effective Clubs before February 15, 2007 to help them plan better.

82nd DISTRICT CONFERENCE

It is hoped many Rotarians from Eritrea, Ethiopia, Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda, will converge on the shores of Lake Victoria at Munyonyo on May 16th-19th 2007 for their 82nd District Conference and Assembly.

This year's conference, is organized under the theme "Our Environment, Our future" The topics to be discussed include: Water and our environment, exploitation of the environment and making the environment sustainable. Other issues to be discussed will include: TRF, Empowerment of Life, New Generations, Challenges of Stewardship and the Importance and roles of lady Rotarians.

The Guest of Honour will be The Nabagereka (Queen) of Buganda, **Lady Sylvia Nagginda**, and the main Key Note will be delivered by the **Hon Prof Wangari Mathaai**, our Nobel Prize winner from Kenya.

So far, about 560 Rotarians have registered, taking advantage of the early registration rates. Now the registration is at USD \$120 for Rotarians, spouses and guests. Rotaractors can register at USD\$60 while Interactors can still register at USD\$20. These rates are valid up to 31st March 2007. Zone 10A covers the whole Sub-Saharan Africa and 50 countries. The meeting will include the R.I. Institute but will also have Rotary Foundation and Membership Development seminars as well as Governors Elect Training.

High powered dignitaries from the Rotary world, among them the then R.I. President Wilf Wilkinson, TRF Chairman Bhichai Rattakul, and senior R.I. staff headed by Ed Futa,

the General Secretary, will attend.

Officially the Institute is considered a refresher course for past and present R.I. officers, District Governors, Assistant Governors, District Officers and Club Leaders. However it is also a fertile ground to breed future leaders both at Club and District level. Since important seminars are organized along with the Institute, the menu will include subjects of interest to all Rotarians and they are all welcome.

The official Institute Hotel is the Hilton in Nairobi but other accommodation will be available. This is only the first and preliminary announcement. It is nine months to the event and as a doctor, I cannot help informing you that within that time frame, usually a baby is conceived, carried and delivered!
