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DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Our Foundation, The Rotary Foundation.

Brigette Tusiime is 4 years old. She suffered massive burns all over her body when their house burnt down. Her entire family perished. The doctors and nurses in the Burns Unit at Mulago Hospital have painstakingly reconstructed her skin and her mind. She now looks upon Dr Khingi as a father. The dedication and love of the staff for the victims, 50% of whom are below the age of five, pulls the chords of one's heart. Through the support of Rotarians and the Rotary Foundation to the Burns Unit, this is possible.

Adam Ben, the only names he remembers, is about eight years old. He was found abandoned, starving and barely alive on the street. His body was a mess of festering sores and wounds, not from disease, but from numerous knife cuts and fire burns he had suffered at the hands of his mother. The Little Sisters of St Francis are dedicated to the care of such children. Through the support of Rotarians and the Rotary Foundation, this is possible.

In the drought hit highlands and rocky farmlands of Ethiopia, man and beast trek for more than 10 kilometers to a water source of muddy and contaminated water, for even that is better than immediate death. They used to

trek, and they still do, but with a difference: the water source is now protected; portable water is drawn through taps; and the animals are watered using a cement trough. Thanks to the support of Rotarians and a Grant from the Rotary Foundation.

In Arusha, the beggars, crippled by leprosy, beg for food. Friday is a feast day for them because that is when the business people feel duty bound to give alms. Feast is relative: when you have been starving, a clean ripe banana is a feast. They used to. Now many of them leave in Upendo, produce crafts, and grow food. Thanks to the support of the Rotarians and a Grant from the Rotary Foundation.

In the Cura home, it is a whole new life for children who did not have any real hope in life. And a whole new life for the Rotarians too! Because when we support those in need, we are heavily rewarded; sometimes I think over-rewarded by the good feeling, the feeling that we do have some value outside ourselves.

Through Group Study Exchange, through Ambassadorial Scholarships, through Youth Exchange, young people are going to other parts of our world and learning a key lesson: outside our colour and cultural skins, we are all the same, with the same basic needs and drives; with the same weaknesses and strengths; with the same yearning for love and belonging.

NEWS FROM NORTHERN UGANDA CLUBS

Allan Jingo were among a team of District and Country officials that paid a visit to Gulu on Saturday 14 October 2006, to provide training, support, encouragement and an opportunity for exchange of views with the Rotarians from the Rotary Clubs of Gulu and Lira and Rotaractors from the provisional Rotaract clubs of Gulu Community and Gulu University.

A 4 hour long training session that focused on the New Generations, Management of Matching Grants and a question and answer session provided the more than 35 participants with information that led to the clubs resolving to take advantage of the various resources available for them to become more effective Clubs. The training session was followed by a lunch fellowship, during which the DGE, assisted by Ass. Governors, Carol Abeja & Connie Tukwasibwe, PP Andrew Muguluma of RC of Kampala Ssesse Islands, PP Herbert Muyinga and Rtn. Hood from RC of Muyenga inducted 3 new Rotarians into the Rotary club of Gulu and 2 into the Rotary Club of Lira.

ERADICATING POLIO IN THE AFRICA REGION

A three day meeting was held during October 2006 at Speke Resort Munyonyo in Uganda on eradicating Polio in Africa. The Africa Region Certification Commission (ARCC) was sitting to receive reports and documentation on their activities towards Polio Eradication. It is expected that if the ARCC is satisfied with progress made, it will make decisions as to which seven countries can be declared Polio-Free.

The District Governor and the Rotary fraternity were represented by the DGE Chris Mutalya who in his remarks, provided a history of Rotary International's commitment to global Polio eradication since 1979. He informed the meeting that Rotary members have given more than USD 650 dollars and countless hands-on-volunteer hours to this critical effort. The meeting greatly appreciated the efforts of Rotary towards polio eradication and called for further support to this just cause.

The Uganda committee for the Rotarian Action Group for Population & Development plans to:

1. Introduce and popularize issues of Population and Development among Rotarians in Uganda.
2. Serve as a link between the Rotary clubs in Uganda, Members of the Rotary Action Group for Population and Development in Uganda and the International Board of the RFPD.
3. Serve as a resource to Rotary clubs in Uganda for the development of Population and Development projects
4. Serve as a link between Rotary clubs in Uganda and other national partners in Pop. & Devt., including Government, NGOs and the Private Sector.
5. Encourage and invite Rotarians and other members of the Rotary Family in Uganda to participate in Population & Development activities and to encourage Rotary Clubs to implement Population and Development projects.

6. Monitor and publicize the implementation of Population & Development projects by Rotary Clubs in Uganda.
7. Arrange for suitable forum for Rotarians, Rotary clubs and other partners in Uganda to discuss population and development issues, including an Annual General meeting of the members of RFPD in Uganda.

Members of the committee have already paid introductory visits to various clubs and plan to hold the first workshop on Population & Development on Saturday 28th October 2006, in Iganga.
